Keynote presentation. Moving mental health services closer to the people: The role of primary care in addressing mental health across the life course (30 mins)

This keynote presentation has two objectives:

The first objective is to explore how early experiences, social determinants, and key transitions influence health and well-being over time within the life course. It will highlight the significance of social context and a cross-sectoral approach—including culture, socioeconomic status, and policy environments—in shaping health trajectories. It will also address contemporary societal challenges that affect mental health across various life stages.

The second objective is to underscore that primary care is one of the most effective entry points within the broader ecosystem of mental health service delivery. It serves as the first point of contact for individuals at all stages of life—children, young mothers, adults, and older adults—and is uniquely positioned to detect, prevent, and manage mental health conditions early. It will introduce the four strategies for scaling up mental health services in PHC as practical ways to integrate mental health care into primary care.

It will emphasize the critical role of proactive community outreach and the use of data-driven population health management (PHM) tools to enhance case-finding. AI's capacity to analyze extensive data enables early detection, personalized treatment, and improved outcomes. Nonetheless, challenges such as data privacy, algorithmic bias, and the complexity of human emotions emphasize the importance of ethical and cautious implementation.
